Wildfires Raging Through L.A. - How Were SOCES **Students Affected?**

The recent wildfires in Los ▲ Angeles, such as the Palisades, Eaton, and Hughes fires, have left a major impact on the city. These fires burned thousands of acres, destroyed homes and businesses, and forced mass evacuations. The fires are not yet 100% contained, but as the communities begin to rebuild, it's important to understand what happened and what we can do to prevent future disasters like this. Other fires included the Woodley, Sepulveda, Sunset, Archer, Hurst, Lidia, and Kenneth fires.

Strong Santa Ana Winds and dry plants caused the Palisades fire. The fire started near the Pacific Palisades and spread rapidly. According to NBC, in total, the Palisades Fire destroyed 6,837 structures. This included 5.419 homes, 135 multi-family residences, 3 mixed use buildings, 158 commercial properties, and 1,115 minor structures. The Eaton Fire, which started near Altadena, was even more devastating, destroying 9,418 structures and damaging 1,073. The Palisades and Eaton fires combined a total of over 37,000 acres, which is an area larger than all of San Francisco. Firefighters worked around the clock to contain the fires, but the extreme conditions made it a difficult battle.

As climate change worsens, wildfires in California have become even more extreme and unpredictable. The most common causes of California fires are arson and power lines, but recently according to calmatters.org, fires caused by lightning have become more common. "Scientists say to ex-

pect more lightning as the planet warms. And, aided and abetted by drought, more than 163 million trees have been killed by drought or insects". Apart from dry grasses, investigators are still looking into what really started these fires. AP News reported that exposed utility wires might have played a role in the Eaton fire. Unsurprisingly, better infrastructure upkeep is being demanded by many to prevent horrible incidents like this from happening in the future.

The wildfires left thousands of people displaced. Many lost their homes, schools, businesses, and jobs. AP News reports these fires "have claimed the homes of numerous celebrities, including Billy Crystal, Jeff Bridges, and R&B star Jhené Aiko, and led to sweeping disruptions of entertainment events." There were serious economic and social impacts when small businesses closed in the affected areas. Whole Foods Magazine reports that in addition to the property damage, the fires affected local supply chains, which left many unemployed and communities struggling to rebuild. According to Nicholas B. Irwin, Ph.D, in Whole Foods

Magazine, "With the recent estimates, I think we are getting a clearer picture of the massive economic damages from these wildfires. It is projected to top \$50 billion in losses, which will make it the costliest wildfire in U.S. history at more than triple the losses of the 2018 Camp Fire. It may even rival the economic losses from some of the major hurricanes that have hit the U.S. in the past few decades." Although efforts to rebuild are now in progress, it will take years to take care of the long-term effects on local economies, insurance rates, and real estate markets.

Extreme weather. old infrastructure, and climate change have all contributed to these wildfires. These devastating fires serve as a reminder of the growing wildfire crisis in California. We all owe a huge thank you to the first responders, firefighters, and volunteers, who risked their lives to protect us throughout this tragedy. Despite their incredible efforts and bravery, the government needs to prioritize preventative measures like enhancing infrastructure, creating stricter and stronger fire safety laws, and funding better land management.

Cell Phone Ban Starts at **SOCES**

his semester, the district decided that the cell phones were too distracting and it was time to restrict their use during school hours. At the start of this semester, the district notified the parents and students that phones would be banned throughout the school day at the beginning of Spring semester. Some believe that this will be better for the students and will make them focus more on school work rather than on their phones. Still, others believe that the idea isn't the greatest because the students won't be able to contact their families. In cases of a private emergency, students will not have easy access to their phones.

The phones will be locked away in 'Yondr' pouches, which will lock the phones into a secured bag. At the end of school, students will be able to open these pouches with a magnet called the "unlocking base."

Tyrone, SOCES security guard, shared his thoughts and his approach to this situation."I think it's good for the students and I believe that the students will be able to focus and pay more attention to their studies. The district thinks that

the students aren't paying attention and only use their phones during class time... they are always on their phones no matter where. Bathroom, office, class, everywhere. The teachers are getting sick of it and the same goes with the district."

Tyrone finishes off by adding details on how the work might be implemented and how he personally thinks it'll work on the students. "Phones shouldn't be brought to school at all and I don't know how exactly the school will implement it, but I do know that it's going to be a rough transition. My personal opinion on this is that I know it's going to be hard for many students and they struggle a lot, but I also believe that this should work out. And for all the students that are wondering how they will contact their parents for an emergency, I'm sure that the office has already found a way to contact parents in case of any emergency".

Adding on, our Cross Country Coach Joel Valle talked about how there are pros and cons to this situation and how he believes this situation might be implemented. "The cell phone

ban is a good and bad choice for LAUSD students. There are pros and cons: Pros: will be that the students will not be distracted anymore and more focused in class. Cons: in case of an emergency they will not be able to contact their families immediately unless they go to the main office."

Coach Joel feels neutral about the situation. "I believe that the situation will be implemented with teachers having a designated area in their classrooms where students will put their phones and return at the bell or they will not be allowed to bring them to school".

Lastly, a personal response from a student. Dahlia D. Wallace said that it would be a good thing. However, she is concerned about children with disabilities. "I think it's a good

concept, however I believe students with ISO's or 504s need to have accessibility to them in case of any emergencies or problems that they may be dealing with."

A semester later, the SOCES community still has mixed feelings about the cell phone ban. As the ban moves closer, students are all interested to see its effects, and hope they make learning better.


Between 11:50 and noon they said their goodbyes, took another group photo, and did a shared dance activity, then they left the school.

Fire Relief Efforts at SOCES: How can you Help?



ICE Raids and February 3rd Protest

onald Trump has returned as president of the United States, and he is not wasting any time fulfilling the promises he has made to the American people. Following his inauguration on January 20, 2025, the second term president has been issuing executive orders left and right. One of the biggest issues that Trump seemed to address throughout his campaign has been the mass deportation of millions of immigrants. During this time, not only have federal troops been sent to the Southern border, but military aircrafts are now being used to deport immigrants.

The president is currently collaborating with the rest of his administration to formulate the beginning of the deportation orders he had promised. If successful, this plan will speed up deportations and encourage an increase in detention centers.

Raids conducted by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (otherwise known as ICE) have been occurring throughout the country. Major cities such as Chicago, Denver, Los Angeles, New York, and Washington D.C. will be the first to anticipate large-scale raids in immigrant communities.

There have been an increasing number of ICE officers being sent to these immigrant dense cities. In addition, the De-

partment of Homeland Security has made a statement sharing how the policy that once prevented ICE officers from arresting undocumented immigrants in sensitive areas (churches, schools, hospitals, etc.) will be coming to an abrupt end.

According to the Los Angeles Times, the recent rumors about ICE raids taking place during the ongoing Pacific Palisades fires appeared to be false. The Department of Homeland security announced that no large-scale raids had been scheduled for that time. Moreover, "the federal agency said it does not conduct immigration enforcement activities during major emergencies" (Los Angeles Times). However, ICE has not shied from conducting raids in other parts of the nation.

Chicago was one of ICE's primary targets as the federal agency was roaming all over the city. On Sunday, January 26, over half a dozen ICE sightings occurred throughout the day.

With two members of Trump's administration being present in Chicago (including Tom Homan, Trump's appointed "border czar") arrests were inevitable. Homan stated in multiple cases that "Chicago [would be] ground zero for mass deportations" (Chicago Tribune).

ICE destroyed communities as family members,

friends, and neighbors were arrested throughout the day. One Chicago native shared with the Chicago Tribune "They took our neighbor's dad [...] My parents were crying. We are terrified." What to do if ICE goes to your home:

With ICE raids spreading throughout the nation it is imperative that undocumented immigrants remember their rights. If ICE comes to your home it is illegal for them to enter your property without a legal search warrant. Arrest warrants or administrative warrants are not enough to let them enter your home. Do not open the door or let any officers enter unless you see proof of a warrant. If a warrant is shown, check the signature line located at the top to make sure it was signed by a

In the chance that the officers do enter your home, do not physically resist them. At this point, the only thing recommended is to inform them that you do not consent to their entry. Refuse to sign any documents and always ask for an attorney.

If possible, try to document what happened. Taking pictures, videos, or even writing down what happened can be very useful to your case. Furthermore, writing down badge numbers and mentioning whether the officers interfered with your documentation could be a huge help. It is also vital to inform officers if you are a minor.

Lastly, report any raids or checkpoints sighted in your area. To report any ICE sightings in Los Angeles call (888)624-4752.

DEI has since been turned into racist attacks towards minority employees inferring that they were only hired for their skin color. President Trump even blamed the recent deadly plane crash in Washington DC on a DEI hire without any evidence to support the opinion.

It has been five years since George Floyd was murdered. Since that time the term "Black Lives Matter" has been attacked as being racist.
